BARNEY'S BUMBLINGS

Well here we are at the end of the 2000 season which seems to have gone by in a flash. The laying up supper and SYC Annual Prize Giving is on the 11th November and, as usual, is to be held in Cliff House. It makes a very good evening and I hope to see you then (please, book in for the supper).

This has been an excellent year for the Yawl fleet in every way, both on and off the water. With 20 new full owner members and several new associate members your association has never been stronger. This of course does r ke for additional administrative work and I must thank Tun Bass on your behalf for all his sterling efforts. At the moment he can cope and is keeping on top of matters. As I said at the AGM Tim should never have to buy beer at the Yacht Club because hardly a day would go by without him having to do something regarding Yawls. Please, please help by paying your very modest subscription to Tim by the end of April 2001. I'm not happy that he should have to chase, remind and even mention publicly at sponsored prize-giving events that members need to pay. Tim should have the job put to bed by the end of April so that he can enjoy sailing himself next year. You must be a member of the Association to race so please pay by the end of April to avoid the 'No-bell' prize!

NB. It will be a requirement that all boat owners send their original measurement certificate with their subscription next year. Please search your file now. if for any reason you have not got one or it is mislaid please pentact the Secretary in order to avoid Tim having a heap work next Spring. Thank you. We will photocopy the certificate and keep the copy on file returning the original.

We will try and maintain a file on each boat with regard to ownership, certification, weighing and measuring (a sort of mini-history). With David Gay's Y14 Blackbird looking so good after 60 years there's no doubt these Yawls will be sailed long after we are gone, so records become more interesting as time goes by. It would seem that some people just do not sell their Yawls at all and they become family heirlooms. Young James Gilliam, son of John Y17, Blinkie, has inherited Y25, Curlew and is proposing to do a major re-fit. We look forward to seeing her on the water.

When a Yawl is sold she ceases to be a Salcombe Yawl until the new owner obtains a valid certificate from the Secretary. It should be incumbent upon the seller of a Yawl to ensure that the buyer is aware of this and obtains a certificate in his/her name. It may not seem important if the buyer does not intend to race but it becomes very important if a Yawl is sold years later and the new buyer wants to race. The difficulty arises if the seller has no certificate as there could have been repairs or modifications that make the Yawl out of class.

There have been many more Yawls racing this year than ever before. It is good to see numbers holding up well in both early and late season. With more new boats on the stocks for next year there should be some keen sailors wanting to get their new boats "run in" early next season. It augurs well for the class. it is good to see the class developing so strongly but it is even better to see the strength of the "Blue Flight", the old B fleet. With 24 entries in the Blue flight in this year's Regatta this flight could soon be split into 2. The Harbourmaster does not like more than 30 Yawls on the start line for safety reasons. It may well be that some competitors would like to see a third fleet and a chance to win a trophy or two. A re-think on the names of flights to possibly Swifts (Red), Swallows (Blue), and Martins (Yellow). What do you think? With the anticipated demise of the "old boat" pre-141 prizes there should be trophies that could be allocated to a third flight. There is no doubt that the post Yawl 141 fleet is becoming dominated by the newer boats now that their numbers have increased to Yawl 167. With more new boats next year any pre-141 boat is going to find it hard to keep up. Only 6 of the Red Flight in this year's Regatta entry of 22 were pre-141 and only Paul Ellis in Y98 Sandpiper made the top ten. By next season the top 3 of those 6 will be in post 141 boats leaving yours sincerely to give the Reds one more year before 60 years of wear and tear take their toll or if the osteoarthritis doesn't get there first! We'll see! What do you think John Gilliam, Jonathan Britten and Rob Adams. are we destined to be Swallows???

An excellent year on the social side started with a Curry evening on 12th April in London. Well over 20 of us enjoyed an excellent meal in a room set aside. All very convivial and with a £20 all in price tag the consensus is to do it again but earlier next year. There were good supper evenings at each of the open meetings and a well attended cocktail part at the August Bank Holiday weekend. The golf day on Friday 25th August was again well attended and a successful event (full report elsewhere in the newsletter). Even "AJ" Squire was heard muttering that his first attempt at golf left him wanting to practise for next year. Don't AJ, it only makes you worse!! Instead of the Regatta Week Yawl Supper a Ball was organised by Sue O'Brien, Maggie Hartley and Penny Reed, who initiated the idea. our grateful thanks for all their hard work in a relatively short time. A fun packed evening with the Chairman hosting our guests and giving a short sermon. How do you follow that? Ideas, comments and suggestions please! Our skittles team started well with 2 wins but have since gone down the swanee. Anyone interested in participating in skittles, even if only once or twice, please contact Tim Bass. On October 14th a dinner was held to mark the 80th birthday of our Honorary Life Member Harris Thorning. A formal

The trophy is awarded to the first owner-helm over 60 years old in the Monday race of the Town Regatta Week.

THOUGHTS FROM PETER HOWARD Y160 Crew

I want to address some of the issues connected to the 'dry-sailing' of Yawls. I leave the technical aspects to those best able to discuss them, and keep to the other matters that affect sailors and residents.

At the moment, only a handful of yawls are dry sailed,

and it appears that congestion only occurs at the busiest times of the season. Imagine the position if 20, 30 or even 40 yawls want to launch at once. Even in the low season a dozen yawls being run down one slipway in time for one race doesn't bear thinking about.

Where will the cars go? At the moment, we join our tenders in several places: the yacht club, the dinghy park, any of four pontoons, East Portlemouth etc. If the boats are launched at Batson Slip there will be a build up of cars to add to the congestion. Will the harbour office find spaces for us all?

The hale and hearty, and those with Special Services training, may be able to manhandle their boats to and fro, but many of us have neither the strength nor desire to start Saturday afternoon with a hernia or worse. It is unfair if older or slighter crews are prevented from racing competitively.

If the yawls are dry-sailed, a couple of rows of moorings will be returned to the Harbour Master for allocation to other craft. In Chichester Harbour, for example, the Solent Sunbeams, Swallows and X-boats are wet-sailed and the prospect of beautiful wooden boats is unchanged since before the war. Hayling Island, contrast, now dry-sails its fleet of Flying Fifteens, and true mooring trots have been given over to Boston Whalers, Dorys and assorted bilge-keelers of varying provenance.

Our own harbour Master will have another 40 or so moorings to re-allocate and there are no prizes for guessing to what sort of vessel they will go! Two or three dozen extra powerboats in the harbour?

The outlook over the water is of course mostly Nature's work, but a contributing factor to the glorious view out over the foreshore must be the presence of our very own fleet of traditional wooden boats. There will always be progress, but let us not change something that is truly unique to Salcombe and will be difficult to replace.



Crews race Sunday afternoon.



SAFETY SNIPPETS

<u>Motto:</u> "Go where you are looking and look where you are going".

With an ever expanding Yawl fleet safety becomes an increasing issue. It is to everyone's benefit that helpful hints are passed on, especially to sailors who are new to Yawls. Yawls are sailable in quite strong winds and it is at those times that the small things become vital. Also during July and August when the harbour is busy it is easy to be concentrating on racing to the exclusion of other aspects of safety. If you have any suggestions for safety snippets please forward them to the Ed. Here are 4 to start it off:-

- Keep the mizzen slack before the start to make bearing away easy.
- Keep a stopper knot on the main sheet for crash jibes.
- Check all rudder fittings are sound before every race.
- Keep the helm's toestraps taut to prevent them fouling the tiller and inducing an involuntary bearing away (leeward broach!).
